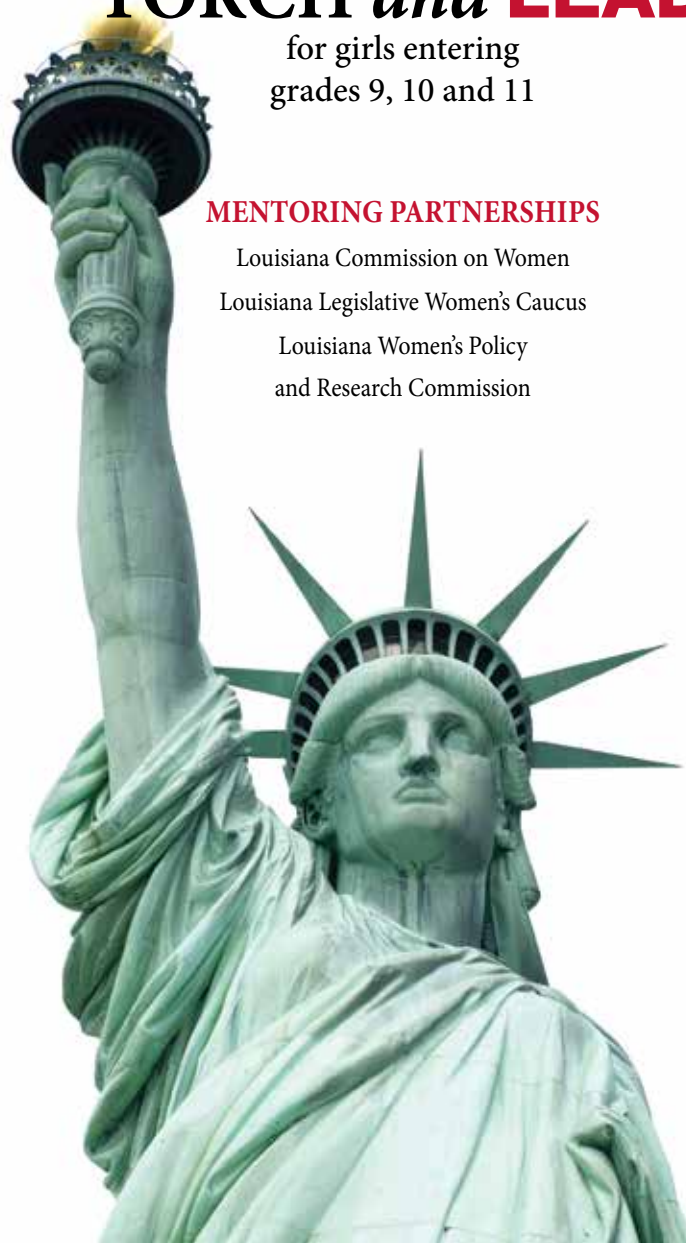

WHY LIGHT THE TORCH AND LEAD?

The vision of the Louisiana Girls Leadership Academy (LGLA) is to develop high-potential leaders in community and public service through responsible citizenship. Girls will network with peers and be mentored by experienced women to develop knowledge and skills for future leadership roles.

The LGLA program focuses on:

- Communication
- Situational leadership
- Public service and responsible citizenship
- Current issues in Louisiana public policy

LGLA will include an annual Leadership Service Project. The 2014 Academy Leadership Service Project will focus on energy and the environment.

WHO CAN ATTEND?

Girls entering grades 9-11 in the 2014-2015 school year are eligible. LGLA participants will be selected by a committee of the LCWGB board.

FEATURED SPEAKERS



Elizabeth Smart
The kidnapping of Elizabeth Smart was one of the most followed child abduction cases of our time. Smart was abducted on June 5, 2002, and her captors controlled her by threatening to kill her and her family if she tried to escape. Fortunately, the police safely returned Smart back to her family on March 12, 2003 after being held prisoner for nine months.

Because of this traumatic experience, Smart has become an advocate for change related to child abduction, recovery programs and national legislation. Smart triumphantly testified before her captor and the world about the very private nightmare she suffered during her abduction, which lead to his conviction.

Smart is currently involved in the Elizabeth Smart Foundation, and she has helped promote the National AMBER Alert, the Adam Walsh Child Protection & Safety Act and other safety legislation to help prevent abductions. In addition, she has chronicled her experiences in the *New York Times* best-selling book, *My Story*.



Alexis Jones
Alexis Jones is an all-American, southern belle, Texas tomboy. She grew up in Austin moved to Los Angeles where she completed a bachelor’s degree in international relations and a master’s in communication management, both from the University of Southern California.
Jones discovered her passion for inspiring girls and women after starring in *The Vagina Monologues*, a progressive women’s play written by Eve Ensler. Following that role, she hosted a TV show on the red carpet, worked at Fox Sports and ESPN, and was a contestant on the hit CBS reality TV show *Survivor*.

Leveraging her entertainment background as a platform, Jones launched I AM THAT GIRL nonprofit and quickly became an internationally recognized speaker, media personality, activist and author. Jones’ first book, *I AM THAT GIRL*, was released January 2014.



Scott Angelle
The Honorable Scott Angelle currently serves as Louisiana Public Service Commissioner. He has served as Secretary of the Louisiana Department of Natural Resources, Gov. Bobby Jindal’s legislative liaison and as interim Lieutenant Governor of Louisiana. Angelle will assist LGLA by presenting the five E’s as the academy’s public policy focus.



Eric Frederick Skrmetta
A lawyer, businessman, husband and father, Eric Skrmetta was elected to the Louisiana Public Service Commission in 2008, holding one of five seats on the statewide body that governs utility providers, railroads and other public services in the Pelican State. Commissioner Skrmetta is currently in his second year as Chairman of the Commission. He will assist LGLA by serving as a judge for the Public Service Projects on entergy and the environment.

The following criteria will be considered: 1) participation in service and leadership organizations in school, community or church; 2) offices held in organizations; 3) honors and awards received; 4) school GPA (minimum 2.6); 5) one letter of recommendation; and 6) a student essay on “Why I should be a leader selected for LGLA” (150 words).
